What do we know?

- Pretrial risk assessments neither effectively account for the dynamics of domestic violence cases nor incorporate victims' voices
- St. Louis DV Case Study when an effective assessment is not in place, the default is to not release DV offenders, which may not be best for both victims and offenders
- Op-ed on bail reform in DV cases

Pretrial Risk Assessments Currently Being Used

- Mecklenburg County, NC Public Safety Assessment (PSA) and Lethality Assessment Protocol (LAP)
- Buncombe County, NC Virginia Pretrial Risk Assessment Instrument (VPRAI) (currently implementing PSA), Ontario Domestic Assault Risk Assessment (ODARA), and LAP
- Pima County, AZ PSA and APRAIS Domestic Violence Risk Assessment Tool
- Lucas County, OH PSA and Dr. Campbell Danger Assessment Law Enforcement Tool (DA-LE)
- Cumberland County, ME VPRAI and ODARA

What's the problem?

- Both pretrial staff and judges do not always receive LAP, ODARA, and/or other DV-specific assessment information, often resulting in low risk assessment scores, inaccurate pretrial release decisions, and improper supervision
- Pretrial services case managers lack access to information that could be provided by DV victims, which could result in both lethality and pretrial risk assessments being completed fully and accurately
- Appropriate release conditions are needed to ensure victim and community safety from truly high-risk DV offenders
