Problem:

Revolving Door of Incarceration



Planning/Design

Provide enhanced services to a targeted population - (women, LGBTQ +, low income, and people of color) employing a personcentric approach in identifying the needs of the individuals using the LSI-R and LOCUS (best practices) to develop strategies for accessing community partner services.

Lake County Jail High Utilizers Program Jail Days



Based on overall reduction of jail bookings



Outcomes: 25 Clients

- 14 Successful completions
- > 75% Received Sustainable Housing (6 of 8) and obtained Employment (12 of 16)
- 77% Accessed & received Substance Use Treatment (13 of 17) and 80% Remained in Recovery
- 71% Accessed & received Mental Health Services (5 of 7)
- > 71% Accessed Family Advocacy Services (5 of 7)



Lessons Learned

- ▶ 67% needed medical/dental health literacy
- Improved Jail operations notifications of rebooked/released inmates
- Expansion of enhanced jail programming
- Consistent data collection through Service Point (HUD)
- Increased Transportation didn't always improve access
- Defining what a success model is for a client

Next Steps

- Expanded high utilizer program with an additional 30 persons
- Crisis Outreach and Support Team (COaST) mobile response launched October 1 st
- Peer Support Specialist Hired

- Leveraging masters level interns
- Working on pretrial release with electronic monitoring and expedited pretrial assessments
